Change Section 2:

CEA represents professionals working in the field of education in corrections and other related disciplines.

Change Section 3:

Education in corrections refers to education and/or training in any field that provides skills to assist in the rehabilitation of incarcerated, formerly incarcerated, and at-risk individuals.

Change Article II Purpose:

The purpose of this organization is to:

- *Serve as the leading professional organization for educators working within correctional settings.*
- *Promote public awareness and understanding of the importance of education in corrections.*
- *Provide leadership and opportunities for professional development for educators in both adult and juvenile facilities.*
- *Strengthen and enhance the organization's structure and operations.*
- *Establish and support meaningful awards and scholarship programs.*

Remove from Section 4 -Membership Categories:

- *Non-profit*

Change Article IX -Meetings:

Section 1- The Association shall hold an annual membership meeting at the time and place of the annual CEA International Conference and Training Event.

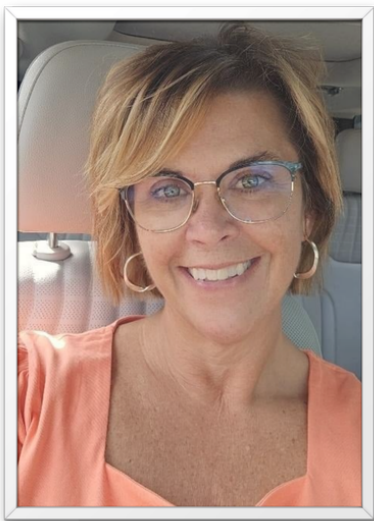

Matthew Graves

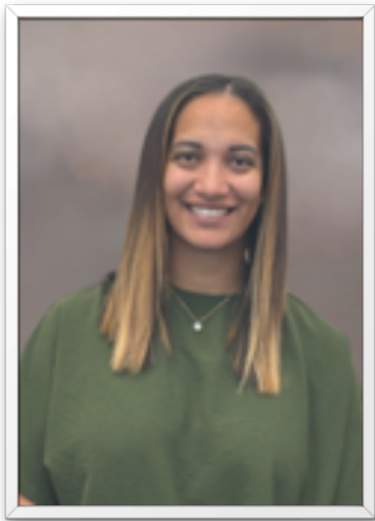

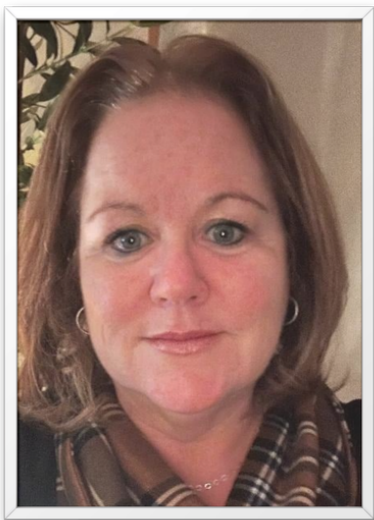

Kammy Hoover



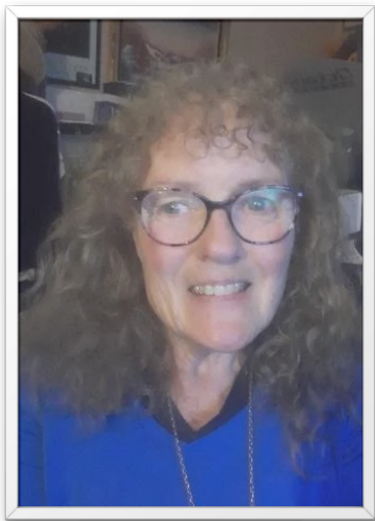

running for Secretary

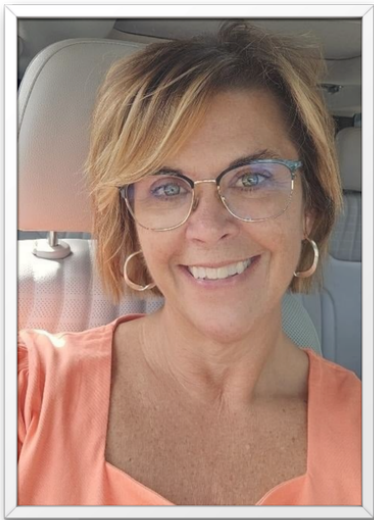

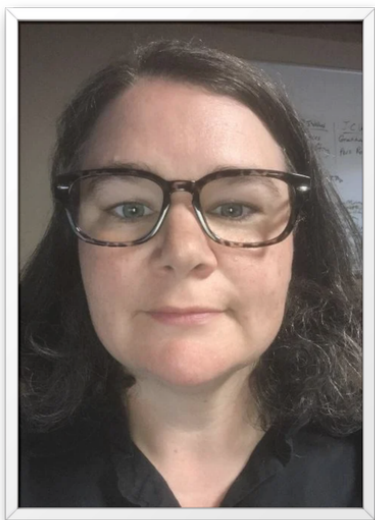
REGION III ASSISTANT DIRECTOR

Judith Leary

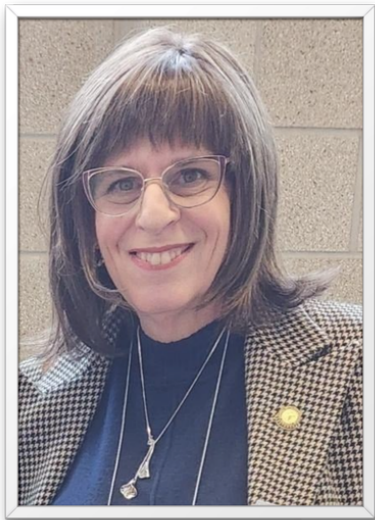
