

Phillip Titterington has been in public service for over 30 years. In December of 2015, he became the Executive Director of the Medina County Alcohol, Drug Addiction & Mental Health (ADAMH) Board. In his short time with the ADAMH Board, he has worked to build strong relationships with stakeholders and members of the community to provide a plethora of prevention, intervention, treatment, and recovery support services. These initiatives include purchasing and renovating a house that has become the home of Hope Recovery Community, a Recovery Community Organization; the building of The Discovery Recovery House, a new 12-bed recovery house for women; the expansion of 24/7 crisis services; the development of a certified peer support network; and the implementation of the Mental Health First Aid Program in each of the county's school districts. Mr. Titterington's current project at the ADAMH Board is the establishment of a child and family trauma-informed outpatient facility.

Mr. Titterington started his career at the Wood County Prosecutor's Office in Bowling Green, Ohio where he helped to create the Youth Services and Programs Department. There he developed and implemented a portfolio of school-based programs, crime prevention initiatives, and diversion programs. He established a county-wide victim/witness program, created the Wood County Gang Task Force, and started the Wood County Youth Olympics which is coming up on its 22 year anniversary. In May of 1999, Mr. Titterington became the first Assistant Superintendent of the Medina County Juvenile Detention Center where he obtained accreditation from the Ohio Department of Youth Services to operate the Center. Shortly thereafter he became the Director of the Medina County Juvenile Court Programing Department and was responsible for providing the Court with alternatives to sentencing youth by utilizing evidence-based and best-practice approaches. In this capacity, Mr. Titterington developed numerous programs, including the Ohio Supreme Court Certified Juvenile Drug Court, the Family Court, and the Community Service program. He holds a Bachelor's of Science degree in Criminal Justice and a Master's degree in Public Administration from Bowling Green State University. Mr. Titterington is very active in the county, serving on many committees and boards. In his free time, he is active in his church, coaches his daughter's travel softball team, and enjoys spending time with his wife Melissa and their teenaged children, Mary and Andy.
