# What life experiences and skills do you feel you bring into your artwork?

I grew up in a family where we spent most of our free time outdoors; hiking, canoeing and camping. It was during these early excursions that I developed a life long love and respect for nature. As an adult, I find that I am still inspired by the beauty of nature, and use my art to express my concerns on current environmental issues. Along with these pieces, I also create works that enable me to speak out on other issues that are important to me. Many of the skills that I use in my artwork were learned in art school. Mixing colors, textile techniques, drawing and design skills to name a few. I've also taken other workshops to learn new skills.

#### Where do you do most of your artwork?

I work in my studio which is in my home. I have a padded table that I can pin into, a large light table for drawing and transferring designs, and a design wall. Since many of my pieces are large, I seem to spill over into other parts of the house as well.


# What are you most proud of when it comes to your artwork?

It's hard to say what I'm most proud of with my artwork. I've been working on a series of larger than life portraits of women I admire for more than 15 years. Lately I've been focused on finishing this series, so it's foremost on my mind.

# Which do you enjoy more: the process or the results?


I definitely enjoy the process of creating art more than the finished product. In each new piece I try to challenge myself to try something new.

I have been a member of SAQA almost from it's beginnings. I think I might have been one of the original PAM members (if you still call it that?) but I have mainly been working in the medium of Traditional Rug Hooking for the past 20 years. I still incorporate stitching in some of my pieces and also create mixed media sculptures. I remain a SAQA member because I still love quilts and enjoy reading the newsletters. I think the rug hooking community has a lot it can learn from this organization.

- Colorful Encouragement: Text on quilts




